GENERAL OVERVIEW

The AD5160 provides a compact 2.9 mm × 3 mm packaged solution for 256-position adjustment applications. These devices perform the same electronic adjustment function as mechanical potentiometers or variable resistors, with enhanced resolution, solid-state reliability, and superior low temperature coefficient performance.

The wiper settings are controllable through an SPI compatible digital interface. The resistance between the wiper and either end point of the fixed resistor varies linearly with respect to the digital code transferred into the RDAC latch.

Operating from a 2.7 V to 5.5 V power supply and consuming less than 5 µA allows for usage in portable battery-operated applications.

FUNCTIONAL BLOCK DIAGRAM








Figure 3. R-INL vs. Code vs. Supply Voltages




Figure 4. R-DNL vs. Code vs. Supply Voltages




Figure 5. INL vs. Code, $V_{DD} = 5 V$




Figure 6. DNL vs. Code, $V_{DD} = 5 V$




Figure 7. INL vs. Code vs. Supply Voltages




Figure 8. DNL vs. Code vs. Supply Voltages




Figure 9. R-INL vs. Code, $V_{DD} = 5 V$




Figure 10. R-DNL vs. Code, $V_{DD} = 5 V$




Figure 11. Full-Scale Error vs. Temperature




Figure 12. Zero-Scale Error vs. Temperature




Figure 13. Supply Current vs. Temperature




Figure 14. Shutdown Current vs. Temperature




Figure 15. Rheostat Mode Tempco ΔR_{WB}/ΔT vs. Code




Figure 16. Potentiometer Mode Tempco $\Delta V_{WB}/\Delta T$ vs. Code




Figure 17. Gain vs. Frequency vs. Code, $R_{AB} = 5 k\Omega$




Figure 18. Gain vs. Frequency vs. Code, $R_{AB} = 10 \text{ k}\Omega$




Figure 19. Gain vs. Frequency vs. Code, $R_{AB} = 50 \text{ k}\Omega$




Figure 20. Gain vs. Frequency vs. Code, $R_{AB} = 100 \text{ k}\Omega$




Figure 21. -3 dB Bandwidth @ Code = 0x80




Figure 22. PSRR vs. Frequency




Figure 23. IDD vs. Frequency




Figure 24. Digital Feedthrough




Figure 25. Midscale Glitch, Code 0x80–0x7F




Figure 26. Large Signal Settling Time, Code 0xFF-0x00




Figure 27. Test Circuit for Potentiometer Divider Nonlinearity Error (INL, DNL)




Figure 28. Test Circuit for Resistor Position Nonlinearity Error (Rheostat Operation; R-INL, R-DNL)




Figure 29. Test Circuit for Wiper Resistance




Figure 30. Test Circuit for Power Supply Sensitivity (PSS, PSSR)




Figure 31. Test Circuit for Inverting Gain




Figure 32. Test Circuit for Noninverting Gain




Figure 33. Test Circuit for Gain vs. Frequency




Figure 34. Test Circuit for Incremental ON Resistance




Figure 35. Test Circuit for Common-Mode Leakage current




Figure 36. AD5160 SPI Interface Timing Diagram $(V_A = 5 V, V_B = 0 V, V_W = V_{OUT})$




Figure 37. SPI Interface Detailed Timing Diagram ($V_A = 5 V$, $V_B = 0 V$, $V_W = V_{OUT}$)

OPERATION

The AD5160 is a 256-position digitally controlled variable resistor (VR) device.

An internal power-on preset places the wiper at midscale during power-on, which simplifies the fault condition recovery at power-up.

PROGRAMMING THE VARIABLE RESISTOR Rheostat Operation




Figure 38. AD5160 Equivalent RDAC Circuit

The nominal resistance of the RDAC between terminals A and B is available in 5 k Ω , 10 k Ω , 50 k Ω , and 100 k Ω . The final two or three digits of the part number determine the nominal resistance value, e.g., $10 \text{ k}\Omega = 10$; $50 \text{ k}\Omega = 50$. The nominal resistance (R_{AB}) of the VR has 256 contact points accessed by the wiper terminal, plus the B terminal contact. The 8-bit data in the RDAC latch is decoded to select one of the 256 possible settings. Assume a 10 k Ω part is used, the wiper's first connection starts at the B terminal for data 0x00. Since there is a 60 Ω wiper contact resistance, such connection yields a minimum of 60 Ω resistance between terminals W and B. The second connection is the first tap point, which corresponds to 99 Ω (R_{WB} = R_{AB}/256 + R_W = 39 Ω + 60 Ω) for data 0x01. The third connection is the next tap point, representing 177 Ω $(2 \times 39 \Omega + 60 \Omega)$ for data 0x02, and so on. Each LSB data value increase moves the wiper up the resistor ladder until the last tap point is reached at 9961 Ω (R_{AB} – 1 LSB + R_W). Figure 38 shows a simplified diagram of the equivalent RDAC circuit where the last resistor string will not be accessed; therefore, there is 1 LSB less of the nominal resistance at full scale in addition to the wiper resistance.

The general equation determining the digitally programmed output resistance between W and B is

$$R_{WB}(D) = \frac{D}{256} \times R_{AB} + R_W \tag{1}$$

where D is the decimal equivalent of the binary code loaded in the 8-bit RDAC register, R_{AB} is the end-to-end resistance, and R_W is the wiper resistance contributed by the on resistance of the internal switch.

In summary, if R_{AB} = 10 k Ω and the A terminal is open circuited, the following output resistance R_{WB} will be set for the indicated RDAC latch codes.

Note that in the zero-scale condition a finite wiper resistance of 60Ω is present. Care should be taken to limit the current flow between W and B in this state to a maximum pulse current of no more than 20 mA. Otherwise, degradation or possible destruction of the internal switch contact can occur.

Similar to the mechanical potentiometer, the resistance of the RDAC between the wiper W and terminal A also produces a digitally controlled complementary resistance R_{WA} . When these terminals are used, the B terminal can be opened. Setting the resistance value for R_{WA} starts at a maximum value of resistance and decreases as the data loaded in the latch increases in value. The general equation for this operation is

$$R_{WA}(D) = \frac{256 - D}{256} \times R_{AB} + R_W \tag{2}$$

For R_{AB} = 10 k Ω and the B terminal open circuited, the following output resistance R_{WA} will be set for the indicated RDAC latch codes.

Typical device to device matching is process lot dependent and may vary by up to $\pm 30\%$. Since the resistance element is processed in thin film technology, the change in R_{AB} with temperature has a very low 45 ppm/°C temperature coefficient.

PROGRAMMING THE POTENTIOMETER DIVIDER Voltage Output Operation

The digital potentiometer easily generates a voltage divider at wiper-to-B and wiper-to-A proportional to the input voltage at A-to-B. Unlike the polarity of $V_{\rm DD}$ to GND, which must be positive, voltage across A-B, W-A, and W-B can be at either polarity.

If ignoring the effect of the wiper resistance for approximation, connecting the A terminal to 5 V and the B terminal to ground produces an output voltage at the wiper-to-B starting at 0 V up to 1 LSB less than 5 V. Each LSB of voltage is equal to the voltage applied across terminal AB divided by the 256 positions of the potentiometer divider. The general equation defining the output voltage at V_W with respect to ground for any valid input voltage applied to terminals A and B is

$$V_W(D) = \frac{D}{256} V_A + \frac{256 - D}{256} V_B \tag{3}$$

For a more accurate calculation, which includes the effect of wiper resistance, V_w, can be found as

$$V_W(D) = \frac{R_{WB}(D)}{256} V_A + \frac{R_{WA}(D)}{256} V_B \tag{4}$$

Operation of the digital potentiometer in the divider mode results in a more accurate operation over temperature. Unlike the rheostat mode, the output voltage is dependent mainly on the ratio of the internal resistors R_{WA} and R_{WB} and not the absolute values. Therefore, the temperature drift reduces to 15 ppm/°C.

SPI COMPATIBLE 3-WIRE SERIAL BUS

The AD5160 contains a 3-wire SPI compatible digital interface (SDI, $\overline{\text{CS}}$, and CLK). The 8-bit serial word must be loaded MSB first. The format of the word is shown in Table 5.

The positive-edge sensitive CLK input requires clean transitions to avoid clocking incorrect data into the serial input register. Standard logic families work well. If mechanical switches are used for product evaluation, they should be debounced by a flip-flop or other suitable means. When $\overline{\text{CS}}$ is low, the clock loads data into the serial register on each positive clock edge (see Figure 36).

The data setup and data hold times in the specification table determine the valid timing requirements. The AD5160 uses an 8-bit serial input data register word that is transferred to the internal RDAC register when the $\overline{\text{CS}}$ line returns to logic high. Extra MSB bits are ignored.

ESD PROTECTION




Figure 40. ESD Protection of Resistor Terminals

All digital inputs are protected with a series input resistor and parallel Zener ESD structures shown in Figure 39 and Figure 40. This applies to the digital input pins SDI, CLK, and $\overline{\text{CS}}$.

TERMINAL VOLTAGE OPERATING RANGE




Figure 41. Maximum Terminal Voltages Set by VDD and VSS

The AD5160 $V_{\rm DD}$ and GND power supply defines the boundary conditions for proper 3-terminal digital potentiometer operation. Supply signals present on terminals A, B, and W that exceed $V_{\rm DD}$ or GND will be clamped by the internal forward biased diodes (see Figure 41).

POWER-UP SEQUENCE

Since the ESD protection diodes limit the voltage compliance at terminals A, B, and W (see Figure 41), it is important to power $V_{\rm DD}/G{\rm ND}$ before applying any voltage to terminals A, B, and W; otherwise, the diode will be forward biased such that $V_{\rm DD}$ will be powered unintentionally and may affect the rest of the user's circuit. The ideal power-up sequence is in the following order: $G{\rm ND}, V_{\rm DD}$, digital inputs, and then $V_{A/B/W}$. The relative order of powering V_A, V_B, V_W , and the digital inputs is not important as long as they are powered after $V_{\rm DD}/G{\rm ND}$.

LAYOUT AND POWER SUPPLY BYPASSING

It is a good practice to employ compact, minimum lead length layout design. The leads to the inputs should be as direct as possible with a minimum conductor length. Ground paths should have low resistance and low inductance.




Figure 42. Power Supply Bypassing

Similarly, it is also a good practice to bypass the power supplies with quality capacitors for optimum stability. Supply leads to the device should be bypassed with disc or chip ceramic capacitors of 0.01 μF to 0.1 μF . Low ESR 1 μF to 10 μF tantalum or electrolytic capacitors should also be applied at the supplies to minimize any transient disturbance and low frequency ripple (see Figure 42). Note that the digital ground should also be joined remotely to the analog ground at one point to minimize the ground bounce.





